

#### New words of the week:

People who **claim to be** (say they are) from the Department of Workforce Development (DWD) may call employees. This call is a **scam** (a false activity or trick) to get employees' personal information.

\*Important! DWD will <u>not</u> ask for social security numbers or financial information over the phone.

People can try a **fraud attempt** (a scam) if they get your personal information. Right now, scam callers are trying to steal unemployment money.

Employees should report **fraudulent** (false, deceptive) activity to the DWD, the police, and their UW departments.

Pronunciation: Say "fraudulent" like this: "FRAW – ju – lent".
