When the word **pan** is combined with other words in English, it means "all" (originally from Greek). For example:

Pandemic = "all people". COVID-19 is a **pandemic** disease affecting everyone in the world.

Pandemonium = "all demons", noisy disorder, chaos, uproar. There is **pandemonium** when protestors and police meet in the streets.

Panorama = "all view", complete view of a surrounding area. You can see a nice **panorama** of Madison from the observation deck on the Capitol building.

Pan-Asian = relating to all the people in Asia. The restaurant serves **pan-Asian** cuisine from India, Thailand, and Vietnam.
