## Noun or verb?

Some **2-syllable English words** can be a noun or a verb. If you say the **first** syllable louder, it's a **noun**. If you say the **second** syllable louder, it's a **verb**. Examples:

Nouns	Verbs
Permit (PER-mit)= a document that allows you to do something <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• I need to get a parking <b>permit</b> for Lot 29.</li> </ul>	Permit (per-MIT) = allow, give permission to do something <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Some streets <b>permit</b> free two-hour parking.</li> </ul>
Refund (RE-fund) = money <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• I got a <b>refund</b> for the items I returned.</li> </ul>	Refund (re-FUND) = to give money back. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Please <b>refund</b> my money.</li> </ul>
Invite (IN-vite) = an invitation <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Did you get an <b>invite</b> to the party?</li> </ul>	Invite (in-VITE) = to ask someone to come <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• I will <b>invite</b> you to the meeting.</li> </ul>
Project (PRO-ject) = specific kind of work <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• We have to finish this <b>project</b> today.</li> </ul>	Project (pro-JECT) = to give a prediction <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• They <b>project</b> COVID-19 cases will rise.</li> </ul>
Protest (PRO-test) = an organized demonstration against something <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• There is a <b>protest</b> about the state face mask order.</li> </ul>	Protest (pro-TEST) = to march or demonstrate against something <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• They march to <b>protest</b> police violence.</li> </ul>
