Circle of Trust® Touchstones

- Be present as fully as possible.
- Trust and learn from the silence.
- Attend to your own inner teacher.
- Know that it's possible to leave the circle with whatever it was that you needed.
- Extend and receive welcome.
- What is offered in the circle is by invitation, not demand.
- When the going gets rough, turn to wonder.
- Speak your truth in ways that respect other people's truth.
- No fixing, no saving, no advising, and no correcting.
- Learn to respond to others with honest, open questions
- Observe deep confidentiality.

A Process for Listening – Groups of 3

A Process for Listening – Groups of 3

Timing cues and directions will be given.

Gather: Introduce yourselves (1 minute each)

Listen: 1st speaker (4 minutes) then silence (1 min)

2nd speaker (4 minutes), then silence (1 min)

3rd speaker (4 minutes), then silence (1 min)

Respond: (3 minutes)
